

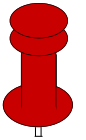

Christopher Hansen, a first year medical student at UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and an MPH student in the Department of Quantitative Methods, worked at the NJ Poison Information & Education System (NJPIES) on a project titled "Validation of Putative Substances Involved in Fatal Poisonings," looking into the differences between what NJPIES staff listed as causes of death for poison victims and substances listed by the medical examiner. This work was done as part of the degree requirements at SPH.

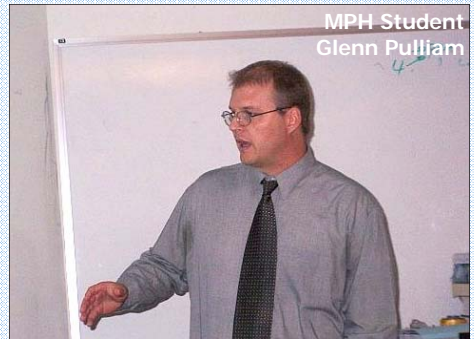

Glenn Pulliam, an MPH student in the Department of Environmental and Occupational Health Occupational Health and an Occupational Health Consultant for the New Jersey Department of Health & Senior Services (NJDHSS) Consumer & Environmental Health Services - Hazardous Site Health Evaluation Program worked on a project entitled "The Bioaccessibility of Lead in Synthetic Turf Materials."

Partnered with the UMDNJ-SPH, Environmental and Occupational Health Sciences Institute (EOHSI), and NJDHSS a limited evaluation of lead in synthetic turf materials was conducted. The objective of this field project is to assess lead bioaccessibility of synthetic turf fibers and synthetic-based turf dust. The materials were obtained as part of NJDHSS's Synthetic Turf Screening Project from existing New Jersey recreational fields and manufacturer/vendor-supplied products. UMDNJ developed bioaccessibility methodologies were used to determine whether lead in synthetic turf materials became soluble under simulated human gastrointestinal digestive conditions. Mr. Pulliam concludes that a significant fraction of the lead contained in the synthetic turf fibers and dust is bioaccessible in human digestive fluids. The findings of this study support that lead in synthetic turf fibers and dust from the synthetic turf fields can be a health hazard.

Mr. Pulliam presented the findings at the New England Lead Coordinating Committee, Portsmouth, New Hampshire on October 7, 2008 and will present at the New Jersey Green Expo Turf and Landscape Conference, Atlantic City, NJ in December 2008.

Junfeng (Jim) Zhang, PhD, MS, Associate Dean, Piscataway/New Brunswick Campus and Global Public Health and Chair, Department of Environmental and Occupational Health acted as Fieldwork Advisor and Site Preceptor.

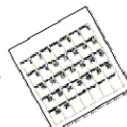
